A Note from Pastor Todd

It is official. I will be retiring from active pastoral

ministry, effective June 30, 2024. In my petition to the Bishop I wrote, "My thirty-eight years of appointed, ordained ministry have been a blessing, filled with grace and beloved colleagues, parishioners, and friends. I recognize the enormous privilege and amazing grace that has been extended to me. Thank you."

What this means for Rush UMC. You will be appointed a new pastoral leader, effective July 1, 2024. The Bishop will work through our District Superintendent, Suzanne Block. She will meet with our Staff Parish Relations Committee and the Leadership Team to discuss our options.

A few observations, from this lame duck.

1) Rush UMC is a community of faith filled with generous, loving, disciples of Jesus Christ, whose potential is yet to be fully realized. God has already given the people of Rush everything sufficient to thrive and grow in the next era of the church. Major capital replacement projects are winding down. Now is the opportunity to invest in the people and programs that will propel this church forward. We are blessed with good people and wonderful families. Don't underestimate yourselves!

2) Give yourselves credit. You endured the pandemic of 2020-2023. Many communities of faith did not. There are a lot of churches that are struggling. While it looks and feels different, worship attendance and participation are about the same as they were before the pandemic. We just have one half of the congregation gathering online each Sunday. New opportunities and challenges are ours for the claiming if we want to nurture and grow every aspect of our worshipping community. You are up for the challenge!

3) Our leadership team is strong, yet our bench is thin. The minimum criteria for serving as a church leader is found in our membership pledge: Will you be loyal to the United Methodist Church and support its ministries with your prayers, presence, gifts, and service?

Our Town Hall meetings have clearly affirmed that we are United Methodist and the Rush church intends to stay that way. Regardless of where General Conference or the denomination goes, we will follow because we have come to believe that our leaders are faithful disciples of Jesus Christ led by the Holy Spirit. We follow United Methodist doctrine and polity (as found in The Book of Discipline of The United Methodist Church) because we believe the General Conference delegates are selfless servants fulfilling God's will. We stand proud of our United

Methodist Church and the rich history of discipleship that it has availed, beginning with John Wesley, continuing to this day. Own it, beloved Rush, and be thankful.

Effective church leaders support the ministry of the church. Divisiveness distracts and destroys. It is okay to disagree behind closed doors, but when a decision is made, it is done with a united commitment and common mission. Discernment is required for the nomination and election of effective church leaders. Asking for volunteers to fill positions is a recipe for disaster. Don't settle for minimum standards or the least common denominator. Expect great things from church leaders and you won't be disappointed.

Effective church leaders pray for the health and wellbeing of the church, for the church to be Spirit led, for our

worship to be vibrant and creative. We pray for our neighbor in need, then follow up with our support. We pray for those of a troubled, angry heart, and seek their

divine transformation. We pray for the sick and dying, for the visitor and guest, for the immigrant and their family, for our students and our shut-ins. We pray for justice, then take up the cause. Those who fail to pray and fail to care should not be considered for leadership positions.

Effective church leaders give, and give generously, until it hurts. Yes, I'm talking about giving time and talent. I'm talking about money, too. We are the church; we are in it together! Each gives according to what and how much God

has given you. The 10% tithe is a starting goal. You can do it. I know you can because my family and I tithe. Giving should involve sacrifice, giving until you feel the pinch, giving until you know that you must give up something in return. Then, and only then, has giving to God become a priority in your life. Effective church leaders don't cut, they contribute to the success of our parish.

Effective church leaders do not govern, they are first and foremost servants of all. They make it a priority to serve Jesus Christ and his Church, to serve the members of our parish, to serve the people in the community in which we reside, to serve our neighbors beyond the horizon. Service implies a commitment to transparency, accountability, and good stewardship of our resources. Service above self is the value and standard that all church leaders should be held accountable to.

4) For the second time in five years, I believe the members of the Rush UMC need to invest in a full-court press finance campaign. The 2024 budget, passed by your Leadership Team, can be found on the church website, under the resources tab, click on documents, scroll down and click on "Proposed Budget 2024".

Giving remains strong, though has started to fade. Pandemic relief money has ended, and we are carrying forward from 2023 only a small reserve that isn't going to last long. Expenses rise at the rate of the Cost of Living. The number of individuals or families ("Giving Units" in stewardship speak) has declined and needs to be increased to stem the flow and keep the church strong. Our choice: give more, or get more people to give, or, both of the above?

Non-designated, pledged giving is best. It reflects trust and confidence in church leadership to use the funds wisely, according to our General Operating Procedures for Finance (found on our website, on the Resources tab, under policies). Designated gifts are best only when they support the mission and vision of the congregation. If they don't, they should be returned (with encouragement to redirect the proposed gift to better support the church).

5) You have the A-Team for staff. Barb, Kellianne, Alethea, and Spencer are simply the best church staff possible. They tirelessly work for your benefit. Each is held to the highest standards, and each performs above expectations. Each is a blessing to you and serves as an effective resource for the parish. Did I say the staff are great?!!!

Now, for some encouragement.

Pray for our District Superintendent, Suzanne Block, and Bishop, Hector Burgos. They are filled with the Holy Spirit and will lead the Rush UMC through this period of transition. Suzanne and I have met, and we have discussed the transition thoroughly. Both the Bishop and Superintendent have your best interest at heart. Work with them, and God will work through them and others for our direction, strength, and vitality.

Pray also for your forthcoming pastor, and their

family, whomever they may be. They will need your support, prayers, and acts of kindness. Roll out the red carpet! Show them what Rush can do! Be enthusiastic because enthusiasm is contagious. Listen and watch for the Spirit to speak and act through their observations, thoughts, and leadership. You will be a great team, just as you

have been a great team for me.

I'll be around after July 1st, but I will no longer serve as your pastor. I'll continue to nurture friendships but will defer pastoral requests to your new shepherd leader. We will continue to reside in the area (40 Belltower Lane, Pittsford, NY 14534), so I'm confident we will say hi at Wegmans or Walgreens. After a year, or so, I may pop in for a visit now and then, but I will always defer to your new pastor. I thank God that our ministry paths joined together for a time, and that we are both better for it.

God loves you, and I will always love you, too.

Safe Sanctuary

The Upper New York Annual Conference adopted a resolution and created a Safe Sanctuaries® policy to reduce the risk of abuse and exploitation of children, youth and vulnerable adults. "The Minimum Standards are mandatory and apply to all local churches/charges, district and annual conference ministries, and those who serve within". The Safe Sanctuary policy of the Rush Church is the Minimum Standards and is listed on the website under Resources. It is imperative that we have enough people willing and trained in these standards so that we can effectively run any ministry in the church that involves children, youth and vulnerable adults. The next district training via Zoom is on February 3, 9-12:30pm. This is the link for the registration: https://uny-ss-basic- feb3.eventbrite.com/. Please let me know if you are planning on attending the Zoom training. I am also looking to do in-person training at the church in March or April of this year. Adult Learning Opportunity: <u>Disciple "Fast Track"</u>

<u>Disciple</u> Bible Study was first introduced in 1987, and millions of people world-wide have participated in the study. However, the concern was that the length of the original course was prohibitive to many people. <u>Disciple Fast Track</u> was written to provide a thorough introduction to the Bible, but in almost a third less time.

We are offering the opportunity to be part of this study, beginning Tuesday, February 20, if there is enough interest. Options are either Tuesdays at 10:15am, or Tuesdays at 7:00pm. Meetings would be at the church, and last approximately 75 minutes for each session. The Old Testament study will be first, and will last 12 weeks. A New Testament Disciple study would then begin in the fall. Please note that this is a commitment of time: besides the 75 minutes each week, there is about 3 – 4 hours a

week of independent study and preparation.



Capítal Stewardshíp Campaign Update

As of Wednesday, January 23, we have received \$269,200.00 or 53.84% in pledges towards our \$500,000.00 goal. Of the amount pledged, we have received \$132,773.49 of which \$22,716.23 has been spent on fabric to reupholster the sanctuary chairs, for the

materials and installation of the carpet and baseboard in the lobby, sitting area and halls and for repairs to gutters. Five thousand (\$5,000.00), not pledged, of this total has been designated for an electronic sign. Pledges continue to be accepted. Mission and Outreach News

"God has sent his only Son into the world so that we can live through him." 1 John 4:9b

No one has seen God, but many have seen you and me. Can anyone say, "I know what God is like because I know Erma - or you?

God is love. Our ability to love is not due to ourselves, it is because we can live through him, the

source of love.



We may not feel loving toward everyone, but we can choose to act in loving ways. We will find our feelings change when "God remains in us, and love is made perfect in is." I John 4:12.

But it is hard to love some of our brothers and sisters. Dr. Amy Oden in a Church of the Resurrection devotional suggests the following:

"One starting imagination practice is to picture yourself on your knees before God, however you image God, in a posture of surrender and openness. Allow God's light and love to pour over you, permeating you with mercy and grace. Now picture an enemy kneeling next to you, also in a posture of surrender and openness before God, also receiving God's light and love, mercy and grace. You do not have to love that enemy or even speak in this visualization. Just allow yourself to imagine both yourself and that person equally before God and receiving love."

Dr. Martin L. King's and Nelson Mandela's writings and examples can teach of the possibility and the practice of loving even our enemies.

Jesus' words to "turn the other cheek" when slapped is not practiced by most. However, the other's actions do not need to dictate how I react. I can return good for evil rather than escalating the conflict.

And then there is Jesus, giving up his life on the cross

and praying, "Forgive them."

During this month of Valentine's Day, may we choose love in whatever circumstance we find ourselves because "God is love and those who remain in love remain in God and God remains in them." I John 4:16




