A Note from Pastor Kyle

²⁶Now an angel of the Lord said to Philip, "Rise and go toward the south to the road that



ara the south to the road that goes down from Jerusalem to Gaza." This is a desert place. ²⁷And he rose and went. And there was an Ethiopian, a eunuch, a court official of Candace, queen of the Ethiopians, who was in charge of all her treasure. He had come to Jerusalem to worship ²⁸and was returning, seated in his chariot, and he was reading the prophet Isaiah. (Acts 8:26-28).

When was the last time an angel of the Lord directed your steps? When was the last time you listened for an angel to speak to you. Perhaps you are the one who would tell me... "All the time!" For the rest of us - it is a rare moment that we would consider an angel of the Lord's involvement in our lives; let alone our day-to-day steps. Let me give you a glimpse into an incredible truth that we all should know and yet each of us tends to ignore or forget – not all coincidences are coincidences.

I do not know why Philip would have been going from Jerusalem to Gaza... and no one who knew him told us differently. Therefore, it was an angel of the Lord that gave him cause to travel. Could you imagine - someone asks you why you went from Rush to Avon and your response was an angel of the Lord!


²⁹And the Spirit said to Philip, "Go over and join this chariot." ³⁰So Philip ran to him and heard him reading Isaiah the prophet and asked, "Do you understand what you are reading?"

Over the last few years, I have found myself alone in crowded areas (actually, this is not a new thing) and have had to work hard to not eavesdrop and infringe on the personal space of those passing by. However, do you really think it would be an acceptable excuse to say to someone, "Sorry... I don't mean to jump into your car and question you but... an angel of the Lord sent me!"

Yet so many years ago the Ethiopian Eunuch's response to this very activity was a heartfelt invitation: "Teach me!"

This does not only happen in the past; it can happen today. I believe that the Lord's angels are longing to send, push or drag us (kicking and screaming if need be) into a new era of discipleship and ministry growth. If we are intentional about our longing to be led AND intentional about our longing to lead; both of which God has placed before us. Being led means being a disciple... and leading means following through on the great commission found in Matthew 28: "Therefore go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you." Leading means making disciples.

The saying "disciples make disciples, leaders make leaders" highlights the distinction between focusing on personal growth and following a leader versus building a movement of discipleship. While leaders can certainly make disciples, the phrase emphasizes that disciplemaking is primarily about **multiplying** followers who then become disciples themselves. This approach is rooted in Jesus' teaching which emphasizes the importance of mentoring, equipping, and empowering others to follow and share the Good News. For years, the Methodist movement has encouraged this understanding



 movement has encouraged this understanding and appreciation of evangelism multiplication. In the United Methodist Church multiplication refers to a strategy of intentionally creating new ministry as well as members to reach new people who will do the same. This is seen as a keyway to fulfill the Great Commission and expand the kingdom of God.

When was the last time you had the opportunity to share yourself and your faith/care/belief with someone you found

yourself next to for no real reason at all? Perhaps you were led there by an angel of the Lord who knew that there was a fledgling disciple who needed your nudge, push or shove to get them into a new life? You, alongside the Holy Spirit, could be the multiplier the church needs.

Rush Church will be collecting donations in May for the Rush-Henrietta Area Food Terminal (RHAFT). During this time of uncertainty, RHAFT is very busy distributing food to families in the Rush-Henrietta area.

RHAFT gratefully accepts all non-perishable food items, personal hygiene products, and paper goods. However, the following items are especially needed: 100% Juice: bottles, boxes, packs; Jello and Pudding; Boxed Potato Flakes, Minute Rice, Hamburger Helper, Canned Chicken (large), Mayo and Condiments; Coffee: instant and ground (no K-cups); Fresh Vegetables; Canned Meat/ Fish Products: Ham, Spam, Tuna, etc; Fruits: cans, jars, packs, etc; Toiletries/Bar Soap/Paper Goods.

You can bring items to the church Monday – Friday from 7AM - 5PM and leave them in the box in the vestibule or on Sundays. We will see they are taken to the center.

Cash donations are also appreciated for perishable food items such as meat and milk. Please make your check payable to Rush United Methodist Church, write in the memo area "RHAFT" and mail it to PO Box 49, Rush, NY 14543 or deliver it to the church. A check will be sent to them at the end of the month.

The need for emergency supplies of food, especially protein, personal hygiene products and paper goods is constant. Thank you for your continuing support of our community's emergency food cupboard.

It's Lawn Mowing Season Again

Your thoughts on how well it has been working and ways to make it better are always welcome.

Do you love to mow? Is your lawn just not big enough? We are always looking for volunteers to help with the mowing and other grounds work. See me or any other mower for details.

Here is my boiler plate from past years....

IT'S LAWN MOWIN' SEASON AGAIN!!! We have a small but dedicated group of volunteers and a variety of lawn mowers to choose from. Are you interested in

mowing or helping with maintenance? We can use the help. You would be surprised how relaxing an hour on the zero-turn is. Just don't get stuck in the mud.

HOW IT WORKS: The lawn is broken up into sections. We typically have preferred sections but cover for each other as necessary. It ends up being weekly-ish if you are a full-time mower. We coordinate scheduling by text. We have preferred days and times, but weather can throw us off. We do our best to cover each other and get around the weather.

MOWERS: We have 3 mowers based on your comfort level - Ex Mark commercial zero-turn for the big stuff, push mower for



the little stuff, garden tractor for the medium stuff. Where do you fit in?

TEMPS: Can't mow all the time? Can you fill in in a pinch? July is always difficult. Can we keep you on a temp list?

MAINTENANCE: Perhaps you can help with oil/filter changes or blade changing/ sharpening. Keeping track of hours on the zero-turn would be valuable. We have 5 or so 5-gallon gas cans that need to be kept filled. (Best if you have a trailer to move these all at once.)

> WEEDWHACKERS: We haven't always kept on top of this. Perhaps this is your calling.

CHAIN SAWS: Do you have one? Can we put you on a list? Our trails along the creek can be very messy and can always use some attention.

TRAINING: Would you like to try the zero turn? I am always available by email, phone, or text or talk to another mower.

2025 PAUMCS Annual Conference

I attended the 42nd Annual Conference of the Professional Administrators of The United Methodist Connectional Structure (PAUMCS) that was held at The Wesley Center, Woodworth, Louisiana on Thursday, Friday and Saturday, April 3, 4 and 5. The Louisiana Chapter and the Executive Committee of PAUMCS served as the conference host.

Those attending the conference worshipped, learned, and networked with other church professionals from across the denomination.

The theme of the conference was "Be Still and Know" The emphasis was on renewing our spirits to enhance our ministry. The setting for the conference was at the Louisiana United Methodist Annual Conference Retreat Center in central Louisiana.

Our first speaker on Thursday was Rev. JoAnn Cooper. The theme of her talk was "Balancing Your Life". She gave us some tricks to use during the day to help us stay on task. One was to take a deep breath and remember that we are children of God - Yahweh, another is to be present at that time, and a third is to be where your feet are, be present. Our second speaker was Dr. Kelley Pears, who is a PTSD/Substance Use Disorders Specialist. His talk was on different kinds of stress and how to deal with them. Eustress is good stress. It can help us to perform, be motivating and adaptive. Distress is bad stress. It can cause us not to function or focus on tasks. Four intentional acts necessary for growth are Ignoring, Prayer, Taking Time and Being Still. He also gave us some tips and tools for relaxation. Our third speaker was Dr. Denise Lott. Her talk was on self-care as related to mental health and scriptural principles. She reminded us that breathing is necessary and can be used meditatively. Also, guided imagery, progressive muscle relaxation, prayer and meditation can all be used to help find balance in our life. "Where you put your heart, your mind will follow. Our next speaker was Todd Rossnagal who serves as Director of Communication Strategies for the Louisiana Conference of The United Methodist Church. He talked about using email effectively, being concise, easy to read, ordered and clean. What time a message is sent doesn't necessarily matter, communicate when you need to. Also, there is tremendous value in a good old-fashioned handwritten note! When using social media, pay attention to how you react to it, what draws your attention. Use this to guide how to use social media. Our last speaker was Rev. Katrena Porter King, Esq, the Executive Director of the Leadership Institute of Acadiana and a Deacon in the United Methodist Church and holds the title of Reverend. Her talk was on Diversity, Equity and Inclusion (DEI). She spoke on conflict resolution, communication and relationships. We learned to set group ground rules, to listen to learn, to put yourself in another's shoes, practicing "I" statements and try to find a middle way to peace.

We also worshipped, celebrated Holy Communion, ate meals together and had time for reconnecting with former friends and making new ones. These are all an important part of the conference.

The mission focus was Louisiana United Methodist Children and Family Services, a nonprofit with 120 years of experience dedicated to improving children and families' mental health and overall well-being throughout the state of Louisiana. PAUMCS is excited to announce the 2026 Annual Conference will be an Eastern Caribbean Cruise to Nassau, Bahamas and Labadee, Haiti on Saturday, April 18 – Thursday, April 23. It will include a visit a Methodist Church in the Caribbean and the Americas (MCCA) worship service in Nassau.



Capítal Stewardshíp Campaígn Update

As of Wednesday, April 23, 2025, we have received \$269,200.00 or 53.84% in pledges towards our \$500,000.00 goal. Of the amount pledged, we have received \$196,128.49 of which \$134,558.69 has been spent on fabric to reupholster the sanctuary chairs, for the materials and installation of the carpet and baseboard in the lobby, sitting area and halls, for repairs to gutters, as a deposit and finishing the drainage work in the parking lot and west side of the building and patching, sealing and striping the driveway and parking lot and for the permit and down deposit on the electronic sign and electrical

work to install the sign. Twenty-one thousand two hundred seventy dollars (\$21,270.00), not pledged, of this total has been designated for an electronic sign. Ten thousand of this was donated from PromiseLand Childcare. Pledges continue to be accepted. Even if you haven't made a pledge, donations to the Capital Stewardship Campaign are gratefully accepted.
