## *A Note from Pastor Kyle*

In our fast-paced, high task and short deadline world, it is easy to fall into the trap of believing that our worth is tied directly to productivity—what we can produce, build, or do. As Christians, however, we are called to a different standard, one that sees through the eyes of Christ and recognizes that every individual possesses inherent, irreplaceable worth from birth to death. This is especially true for the older members of our congregation, who are not merely "seniors" but treasures of wisdom and pillars of truth.

The Bible is overwhelmingly positive about old age, calling grey hair a "crown of glory" (Proverbs 16:31). Our older members are not a burden; they are repositories of God's faithfulness. While the limitations that age may bring might change how someone serves, it does not diminish their value. They bring a depth of wisdom crafted and molded by decades of walking with the Lord, serving the Kingdom and loving as Christ would have us do. Life stories, testimonies of God's grace through trials, a continued presence are essential to our spiritual maturity as a church family.

Conversely, this stage of life often brings the reality of loss: declining health, the loss of friends, or the grief of leaving behind a cherished home. Furthermore, we must

speak honestly about the passing of our loved ones. It is incredibly sad. We feel the void, and we weep. Yet, as believers, we must also recognize that death is a natural, albeit painful, part of the life cycle.


It is tempting to try to rush through grief, to push down the sadness, or to pretend that we are stronger than we feel. However, Ecclesiastes tells us there is "a time to weep, and a time to laugh." And many would say that Jesus himself wept at the grave of his friend, Lazarus. You can find that narrative in John 11:35. Therefore, it is not a sign of weak faith to feel sorrow. It is a sign that we loved someone deeply and that their life was precious.

And the Word Of God is and has been a comfort and

assurance for many. As disciples we are more than normal... we are blessed. 1 Thessalonians 4:13 reminds us that while we acknowledge that loss is normal, we do not grieve as those who have no hope. Death is not a final, absolute end. It is a doorway to God's everlasting promise. However, for fear of turning this even more into a funeral homily, let me simply say as disciples our work never ends, and the blessings never stop. We are a family, and

we walk through every season together—from the joy of new life to the sad, yet normal, losses of old age—sustained by the grace of Jesus Christ.




## Basic Safe Sanctuaries Training

The sale room is ready to accept donations. Especially needed are items such as housewares, home decor, games, toys, small electronics, and cookware.


Please note. We no longer accept furniture. If you have small furniture items like a chair or end table, please contact me.

As of Wednesday, January 28, 2026, we have received \$269,200.00 or 53.84% in pledges towards our \$500,000.00 goal. Of the amount pledged, we have received \$221,864.70 of which \$164,446.69 has been spent on fabric to reupholster the sanctuary chairs, for the materials and installation of the carpet and baseboard in the lobby, sitting area and halls, for repairs to gutters, as a deposit and finishing the drainage work in the parking lot and west side of the building and patching, sealing and striping the driveway and parking lot and for the permit, electronic sign and electrical work to install the sign. Twenty-one thousand two hundred seventy dollars (\$21,270.00), not pledged, of this total has been designated for the electronic sign. \$10,000.00 of this was donated by PromiseLand Childcare. Additionally, a deposit has been paid to repair and replace the board and batten siding to prepare it for staining in the spring. Pledges continue to be accepted. Even if you haven't made a pledge, donations to the Capital Stewardship Campaign are gratefully accepted.

## South Africa Update

This week I accomplished one of my favorite tasks - booking flights to South Africa. Dates for this year's trip are May 6-21. The cost estimate is \$4500. This includes flights, lodging, 2 days of safari and about half the meals. So far, I have return travelers - which speaks to the value of this experience, does it not? I love to introduce new people to these missions so let me know if you would consider opening your heart to these missions. Donna, our generous quilter wants to send a quilt for each of the children at Musa weNkosi so I need packhorses!

I received this report from Nurse Manager Jane today:

"January in Zululand is typically very hot, humid and rainy. The roads we travel are usually dirt and often more pothole than road, with deep gullies that fill up with water, hiding what dangers lie beneath! Last week our staff had to get out of the car, in 40C heat, (over 100° F.) and push the car out of the mud, so every day it holds the possibility of adventures. As well as caring for our families, much of our work entails social problems and advocating for patients. One patient has frequent attacks of shortness of breath which are frightening and distressing. She attends the government hospital for treatment; nebulizing was recommended but there were no machines available for home use. She also could not afford the fee that is due for every visit. Hospice sourced a

machine for her, and the hospital provides the medication. Our nurse contacted the hospital PRO and arranged for her to be a non-fee-paying patient. The hospice intervention means that she can now manage her dyspnea at home, alleviating the long and tiring trip to hospital.

We had a tiny 2-year-old with TB meningitis and abdomen, a very ill child with a young mother. She spent a few months in hospital but

was discharged home in the terminal stage, with no way for her mother to give medication. Fortunately, the team visited the next day and referred her to a newly opened Children's Hospice in Empangeni. After the family

meetings and discussions, she was admitted, she passed away peacefully and pain free two days later." Some of the June '25 team met this child.

Jane said, "I'm running around like a chicken with a mongoose chasing me."


If you decide to join us you will find the question, "How was your trip?" not easy to answer. Aspects of the visit are heart-warming as we witness the loving care provided by the staff. The conditions in which they work are disheartening. However, it is uplifting to provide support in an area of desperate need. Then you might have the nearly heart-stopping experience of an elephant approaching the vehicle or a rhino mom and baby grazing within reach!

Nola, former Assistant Manager wrote, "Words will never be able to express how much and what it means when we receive material, financial, hands on and spiritual support from you all. The difference it makes in the lives of our patients and staff is immeasurable."

We spend a couple days near the end of the trip as "tourists." However, my goal is for each traveler to be challenged by the disparities we witness in living conditions, medical care, as well as between those who are comfortable (which includes us in the lovely BnBs) and those who struggle with day-to-day existence. South Africa has a complicated history. Whether or not you travel with us, I encourage you to read about this fascinating country, so you better understand life for our sisters and brothers of these missions we support and carry in our hearts and prayers. Books and movies about Steve Biko and Nelson Mandela are a good place to start.

I find this meditation from Matt. 25:14-30, The Parable of the Talents, challenging: "The wickedness and laziness that Jesus rails against is the presumption that we possess anything at all, least of all ourselves. His ire is aimed at the hoarding that comes from the fear of being inadequate, as well as our ingratitude for having been made who we are... who we are is a gift itself, freely offered from God's extravagant generosity, given to and for the world. The point is not to perfect our particular gifts or ourselves, but to quit hoarding ourselves from others, and instead to step out in faith that we have been given all we need." Kari Jo Verhulst, Living the Word, Sojourners Nov, Dec 2002.
