

A Note from Pastor Todd

Winter is dark and cold, the death of the former year,



the conclusion of the festive and colorful seasons of Advent and Christmas. Decorations are stored, dried out Christmas trees are kicked to the curb or thrown in the landfill, plow trucks drive by with their rotating yellow lights communicating warning, casting ghostly moving shadows on roadside trees. The only option appears to be to cocoon, hibernate, and hope to wake up May 1st. Death, grief, and mourning abound.

Grief is what we *think and feel* when we experience death or loss. It is entirely normal to experience grief. Isn't it nice to know you are normal? Make a list of loved ones who have died and the losses you have incurred. Death and loss may be recent or years ago. My list includes the death of an aunt, mothers, former parishioners, my pre-pandemic routines, the suffering of others. Who and what are on your list? End of a relationship? Recent move? A much anticipated event suddenly closed or canceled? Death of a pet? Lifethreatening illness?

The more often your thoughts return to the deaths and losses you've occurred the greater your grief. If all

you're thinking about your every waking moment is the death or loss of one you loved, your grief is as hard as it ever will become. It's good to know it won't get any worse. What isn't normal is if your

grief doesn't ease over a period of months or years. If thoughts of sorrow and grief persist, come speak with me. Together, we'll work to find the right coach or counselor to bring you some relief.

With time, as life resolves into new routines and experiences that captures your attention, thoughts of grief decrease with frequency and intensity. This is God's grace working in and through your life and experiences. To withdrawal is to deny this grace and the future growth and healing that God intends for your wellbeing. Give yourself time. Force yourself to keep socially active. Surround yourself with people you know, trust, and love. Start small and simple. Give yourself space for healing.

Mourning is *the outward expression of our grief*. It's what we do. Crying. Journaling. Looking through old photographs. Dressing in black. Making funeral arrangements, writing an obituary, attending the funeral service or grave, going to a reception. Dispersing of stuff (secret trips to the Super Sale Room under cover of night), settling the estate, planting flowers at the grave. Waking in the middle of the night only to find yourself sorting through and reading old letters. Mourning is normal. Isn't it nice to know you are normal? Mouring results in an ability to remember the importance of our loss, but with a newfound sense of peace instead of searing pain. There is life after grief and mourning. Healing is a process, that, over time and hard work, accepts the finality of the loss, acknowledges and expresses the feelings we experience, and makes adjustment to a life absent the loved one, object, or experience.

As your Rush UMC Worship team and I make worship plans for the next six months the progression of the church liturgical year naturally lends itself to healing from winter's death and grief. Our lives are attached at the hip with Jesus. We journey with him to Jerusalem. He suffers, dies, and his winter-cold corpse is sealed into a tomb. Yet, wait. Journey with the women and discover the empty tomb. Come face to face with our risen Lord. Dormant seeds are warmed by the sun, and look! a shoot, a sign of life appears. Not once, but numerous times the resurrected Lord appears to his disciples. Signs of healing and new life abound!

Our journey of faith isn't a life absent of death, grief, mourning, and loss. It is a process of time and effort that leads to Christ's healing and God's grace. Beloved, journey with Jesus and be healed.

It's good to travel this road together.

Our New Rush Leaders!

Leadership Ministries Team: discerns God's will and direction for our church family and the steps necessary to faithfully achieve these goals. Steve was also elected to serve as the chairperson of Leadership.

Board of Trustees: an operational team that serves as stewards of the buildings, church property, legal affairs, insurance, and major financial holdings. In our church, the Trustees have delegated stewardship of our financial holdings to excellent care of the Endowment Committee. Serving through

2022 is Paul Kingsley and Rob Gruschow. Serving through 2023 is Dan Gilroy, Jose Arroyo, and Cindy Gray. Serving on the board through 2024 is Dick Wallace, Lynda Wanzenried, and Geoff Furman. Trustees have already elected their leader, Cindy Gray.

Staff Parish Relations Committee (SPRC): an operational team that serves all Human Resources, employment, and pastoral appointment functions for the church. The SPRC provides annual reviews of the pastor and staff, recommends compensation and benefits, and serves as the primary liaison with the Bishop's Office when there is a change of appointment. Serving through 2022 is Jan Corey, through 2023 is Erin Bills (also elected chairperson), and through 2024 is Lynda Wanzenried.

Finance Committee: an operational team that monitors income and expenses, recommends the annual budget, conducts the annual stewardship drive, and establishes fiscal policies for exceptional stewardship. Endowment Fund Team: an operational team, directed by the Board of Trustees, that establishes, monitors, and maintains all long-term investments and records for the church. They meet as needed to consult with investment partners to minimize risk while maximizing returns. They also receive applications for appropriate grants and loans. The Endowment Fund Team is led by Eric Scheele, serving through 2023. Tanya Hunt is serving through 2022. Casey Beebe is serving through 2024. Serving through 2025 is Gary Edom. Ken Graham is serving through 2025.

<u>Memorial Committee</u>: an operational team that receives and acknowledges all memorial gifts to the church and works with the family to identify and fund appropriate memorials in the name of the deceased. Serving on the Memorial Committee is Barb Kingsley, Tanya Hunt, and Juliet Johnson.

Lay Leaders: Individuals empowered to ensure our core values are met or exceeded, encouraging good communication and cooperation, and can make effective progress. Tanya Hunt is our Lay Leader for Children, Youth, and Family ministries. Steve Williams is our Lay Leader for Worship Excellence. Erma Perkins is our Lay Leader for Mission and Outreach.

particular gifts, or ourselves, but to quit hoarding ourselves from others, and instead step out in faith that we have been given all we need." Kari Jo Verhulst I am hoping for a visit to South Africa April 30-May 15, 2022. I have had

people say, "I couldn't stand to see the poverty." Others ask, "Is it safe?" We miss a lot when we prioritize our security, comfort


